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# Virunga Discussion Guide

### **FILM SUMMARY**

In the forested depths of eastern Congo lies Virunga National Park, one of the most bio-diverse places on Earth and home to the planet's last remaining mountain gorillas. In this wild, but enchanted environment, a small and embattled team of park rangers – including an ex-child soldier turned ranger, a caretaker of orphan gorillas and a dedicated conservationist who's a member of the Belgian royal family – protect this UNESCO world heritage site from armed militia, poachers and the dark forces struggling to control Congo's rich natural resources. When the newly formed M23 rebel group declares war, a new conflict threatens the lives and stability of everyone and everything they've worked so hard to protect, with the filmmakers and the film's participants caught in the crossfire.

A powerful combination of investigative journalism and nature, VIRUNGA is the incredible true story of a group of courageous people risking their lives to build a better future in a part of Africa the world's forgotten, and a gripping exposé of the realities of life in the Congo.

From executive producer Leonardo DiCaprio, VIRUNGA is the feature debut from director Orlando von Einsiedel and producer Joanna Natasegara.

## **FILM THEMES**

#### **GOVERNANCE AND HUMAN RIGHTS**

Virunga National Park is run by a team of dedicated rangers. In a bid to create peace and stability, their purpose is to uphold the rule of law in an area where competing groups scramble to exploit the park's natural resources. By defending the park against oil exploration, park rangers and civil society alike come up against harmful opposition. Acts of bribery, corruption and human rights abuses, initially documented in the film, and later supported by various independent reports, establish why the rule of law and respect for human rights is still a live issue today.

#### **PROTECTED AREAS AND WORLD HERITAGE SITES**

Virunga National Park was established as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1979, and later given an endangered status in 1994. International and domestic law renders any oil related activity incompatible with its status as a protected area. Perhaps because of pressure from the international political and business communities who questioned SOCO's ethical decision to explore for oil in a world heritage site, the company signed an agreement with the WWF in June 2014 agreeing to pull out of the park once seismic tests were complete. However, this agreement did not safeguard for the future of Virunga National Park and the door has been left open for oil operations to begin again should the DRC government and UNESCO agree to declassify all or part of the park. As a consequence, the struggle between conservation and corporate greed remains very real.

#### **BUSINESS IN FRAGILE REGIONS**

Despite being one of the world's richest countries in terms of natural resources, it consistently ranks at the bottom of every global measure of human development. The onus is therefore placed on multinational corporations, such as SOCO, to ensure that adequate measures are in place to manage operations and specifically, not to exacerbate underlying issues when conducting their business. Secretly gathered evidence shown in VIRUNGA, demonstrates SOCO's lack of oversight amounting to allegations of bribery, corruption and human rights abuses by associates, or those claiming to be working in SOCO's interests.

#### **COLONIALISM AND SOVEREIGNTY**

The DRC like many other countries is a relatively young sovereign state, only gaining independence in 1960. As to be expected, it experienced a period of difficulty in establishing its systems, which is why the strength and integrity of the park authority – one of the country's most successful examples of good governance and long term employment for men and women- is so important for the Congo's future. As the park implements the Virunga Alliance- a ten year initiative that sees clean energy alternatives bring sustainable economic and social development to the communities of Virunga and the 4 million people who live within a days walking distance of it- global respect for Congolese sovereignty is at a time of crucial importance.

- 1. What did you know of the Democratic Republic of the Congo before watching VIRUNGA?
- 2. Have you ever visited a UNESCO World Heritage Site? How many can you name and what do you know about the kind of threats some of them face?
- 3. What did you learn about the challenges faced by the Virunga National Park's management team (Emmanuel de Merode and the rangers) and their efforts to overcome them?
- 4. Why is it important that a clean, sustainable energy alternative is found for Virunga National Park? How would this have a positive impact on the country in terms of stability and sovereignty?
- 5. What would be the appropriate course of action for SOCO to take in terms of investigating the allegations brought to their attention in VIRUNGA?
- 6. Do you ever think about where your money is invested (your bank accounts, your pensions, your investments if you have any)?
- 7. What responsibility do international governments have in overseeing the behaviour of multinational corporations working in Africa?
- 8. What did you think about the new development plans underway in and around the park? How do you think the Virunga Alliance will impact on the park and its communities?
- 9. What difficulties do you think a newly independent country such as Congo faces?
- 10. How important is journalism in holding corporations to account?

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# FILM FACTS:

- There are currently 880 mountain gorillas located in the forests shared between the Democratic Republic of Congo, Rwanda and Uganda, living at altitudes of 8,000 to 13,000 feet. Their conservation and protection is a very positive, common objective for all three countries.
- Members of civil society who've spoken out against oil exploration in the park or who are in favour of clean sustainable alternatives have received threats for doing so. You can read more about the effect this is having on the park's communities in independent reports published by <u>Human Rights Watch</u>, <u>Global Witness</u> and <u>The</u> <u>Telegraph</u>.
- The park's conservation work over the last ten years has seen dramatic improvements to the numbers of endangered populations. For example, the park now reports an increase in the number of hippos and elephants.
- Virunga National Park's Director, Emmanuel de Merode, was seriously injured by unidentified gunmen in April 2014, just two days before VIRUNGA's world premiere in Tribeca. He was returning to the park headquarters having just handed over a dossier of evidence to the DRC government documenting SOCO's activity in the region. There is no evidence to suggest that the two events are related. He made a miraculous recovery and returned to the park in May 2014 to resume his duties.

- The First Congo War, which began in 1996, was followed by the Second Congo War - or Great War of Africa - in 1998. Despite an official end to the war in 2003, the aftermath and its detrimental effects are still felt today. The war has directly involved nine African nations and 20 armed groups. By 2008, 5.4 million people had lost their lives to war-related causes, making it the deadliest war since WWII.
- Tourism is at an all time high since Virunga National Park reopened at the start of this year. Accommodation has been full to capacity and the park has hosted guests from all around the world who come for the incredible scenery, astonishing wildlife and of course gorilla trekking. - To date, VIRUNGA has won over 25 international film festival awards as well as the following prestigious nominations. The press attention surrounding the film since its release at Tribeca in April 2014 has driven donations and visitors to the park up and is having a very positive effect on the general public's engagement with the issues at the heart of the film
